#### ALL SAINTS CHURCH, RUDSTON, SOCIAL COMMITTEE

We were pleased to see so many residents at the Pop-Up Open Garden at Rudston House on July 24th. The morning was very warm and pleasant, and wisely that was when most people came and enjoyed a wander around the garden with tea and cake to follow. It was very busy around one o'clock, however the rain came down and although the garden was thankful, we did not have as many visitors in the afternoon. A great big THANK YOU to Simon and Angela Dawson for opening their garden in aid of Church funds. £750 was raised and everyone had a pleasant time.

We have a very special fund raiser to look forward to on Sunday 11th September at 2.30pm when a guest organist has prepared an interesting programme to perform on the fantastic organ in Rudston Church.

Anthony Burns-Cox is from Romsey so enjoyed playing the organ a few years ago, when he was near here on holiday that he has offered to perform a recital for us.

At Oxford Anthony was fortunate to study with Dr Bernard Rose who influenced his future career. He became Director of Music at St. Albans School before moving to Wales as sub-organist at Llandaff Cathedral and Director of Music in the Cathedral School. Later he was appointed Organist and Choirmaster at Romsey Abbey. Some of his pupils have won Chorister of the Year and the Piano section of Young Musician of the Year. He has performed in many different Cathedrals in this country and abroad with regular tours of France and Germany. We are certainly fortunate to have the opportunity to hear him play the Organ in Rudston Church. Many visitors have commented on the size of the Church organ which is another story.

The Organ in Rudston Church forms part of the rich heritage of our village. Sir Alexander Macdonald designed and gifted the organ in 1888 and regularly played the organ at all Church Services for about 50 years. It was the first electric action organ to be built in England outside of London. Sir Alexander recruited a choir made up of men and boys from the Thorpe Hall Estate. The stained-glass window above the organ depicts Sir Alexander at the organ and the choir. More plaques in the Church tell more of the organ's history. Many will remember Clive Barnby playing the organ until in his 90s and he funded .

restoring and rebuilding the organ in 1996. Dick Robinson took over playing the organ when Clive retired and also played into his 90s. Wendy Proctor now plays regularly at our services. Many have admired this instrument including the present Head Organist at Beverley Minster

We hope residents and friends will take this opportunity to hear an expert playing the organ.

Tickets are £5 each and include tea and cake at the end of the performance. Available in advance to help cater for the correct number in the audience. From Jean Corner 01262 420 622 and Margaret Reed 01262 420 648, and also on the door on the day.

We hope to get a full Church for this recital which Anthony Burns-Cox will perform.



The energy crisis that we are all experiencing at the moment is of great concern, I am sure, to many. John Crockford has recently contacted Sir Greg Knight MP regarding energy self-sufficiency in the UK and the next 2 pages are the response that he has received:-

#### Dear John

Thank you for your letter and your queries about energy self-sufficiency in the UK. The subject is a difficult one, particularly given the volatility that has surrounded global energy production in recent years. Factors influencing energy markets include: global Net Zero aspirations and the shift to renewable energy sources which have a more risky short-run supply profile (the wind does not always blow or the sun shine); the coronavirus pandemic and its impact on global energy demand (low and then strongly resurgent, adding to price pressures); and now the impact of war in the Ukraine.

Below I have provided responses to your questions, as well as links to further information, should you wish to research this area further.

## 1. How close are we as a country to becoming self-sufficient in producing our own needs for gas & or electricity?

Page 5 of the attached document shows that as recently as 2005, the UK was self-sufficient in energy supply. Import dependency then grew from 2005 and peaked in 2013. From 2013 the UK has become steadily more energy self-sufficient again, with a reversal in that trend in 2021 due to specific conditions as outlined in the report. See the report for particular figures.

In April of this year, Prime Minister, Boris Johnson, published a new 'British Energy Security Strategy' outlining the aspiration to significantly increase our energy supply and diversification, and our energy self-sufficiency.

# 2. When, or if, we do become self-sufficient as a country in producing enough energy, would we still have to be a part of the world energy pricing, or could we as an energy independent country just drop out and decide the consumer price for our own use?

Via Ofgem, the Government regulates the impact of energy prices on UK consumers, the main tool being the energy price cap. In theory, yes, a government of an energy exporting country could secure lower than average consumer prices for local people.

Note, however, that with the production of energy being increasingly diversified across multiple sources, and with renewable sources being weather dependent, the pursuit of total self-sufficiency is not necessarily desirable. The result could be significantly increased long-run average energy costs for

consumers. Effectively, the government has to consider from where and how to source 'peak load' energy in periods of low renewables production. It may be that sourcing peak-demand supply on the global market will, across time, result in lower average costs for UK consumers.

See, for example, this very interesting article from Norway which relies on hydro-power for electricity production. The current extraordinary set of global circumstances has combined with exceptionally low hydro-reserves for Norway thereby subjecting Norway to the same global price shocks as everyone else. Yet it is not clear that the right answer for Norway would have been to permanently shield itself from such exceptional circumstances. The impact might be lower peak costs in exceptional circumstances, but significantly higher long-run average energy costs. <a href="https://www.thelocal.no/20220819/why-is-the-norwegian-government-against-an-energy-price-cap/">https://www.thelocal.no/20220819/why-is-the-norwegian-government-against-an-energy-price-cap/</a>

In effect, an attempt to permanently shield a country from global energy pricing might have the impact of raising that country's long-run average energy costs and therefore lowering its standard of living. This would not be a good energy or economic strategy.

3. Can the Government force the energy suppliers to reduce the daily standing charge by half for gas and electric, at the same time as removing the VAT on energy prices. This would be a great help to all consumers as a short term measure, as removing the VAT alone will NOT.

The Government's ability to impact household energy prices is governed via Ofgem using the energy price cap. Currently Ofgem is dealing with exceptional gas prices which are affecting everyone around the world. These exceptional price increases have put UK suppliers under extraordinary strain - they can't be shielded from global price rises if they are to secure the energy we need on global markets.

In fact, since January last year, approximately 30 smaller suppliers serving over 4 million households have already gone bust. This illustrates how the Government has only a limited capacity to squeeze the profitability of remaining suppliers further or to ask them to carry losses for long periods.

One opposition politician has said that he would be in favour of a continued low price cap well below global prices. But the cost of doing so would be a <u>staggering £30 billion</u> for a mere six months' relief. The Institute for Fiscal Studies has been extremely sceptical over these claims about <u>how this could be funded</u> suggesting that ultimately the taxpayer would foot the bulk of the bill. In short, neither the UK nor anyone else can escape the current global energy price shock - its cost must be absorbed somehow.

The government has already provided a range of measures to help consumers absorb some of the shock. And if we are to go further, my preference is that we focus on supporting the most vulnerable - those on low fixed incomes; pensioners and recipients of Universal Credit. For everyone else, it makes more sense for us to absorb price rises directly, and at least attempt to respond to them via energy efficiency measures (which will serve us better in the longer run and help with Net Zero aspirations), rather than absorb them via high taxes which will damage our economy and reduce our standard of living.



#### **Rudston's Recipes**

#### **MUSHY PEA SAUSAGE ROLL**

#### **Ingredients**

4 oz sausage meat
10 oz can of mushy peas, drained and mashed
1 small onion, peeled and finely chopped
½ tsp mixed herbs
Salt and pepper
13 oz packet of puff pastry (or you can make your own)
Milk to glaze

#### Method

- Heat oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas mark 6
- Mix sausage meat, peas, onion and herbs together. Season to taste
- Roll out pastry to a rectangle approx. 12" by 16". Place on baking sheet
- Spoon sausage/pea mix into the centre
- Damp edges of pastry and bring sides up. Press firmly together
- Brush with milk to glaze
- Bake for 35 to 40 minutes until golden brown




