As a child I remember the Queen's Coronation, Just the mere thought of this fills one with Elation. Our tiny Mining village draped in red, white and blue Flags, banners and pictures of her majesty too. when the great day arrived, a fancy dress parade. All through the village, a rare site we made. As Sir Walter Raleigh, I was elegant, smart. Cloak over shoulder, I did look the part ... In the evening a concert given by the locals. Special penned recitations, solo's and vocals. Songs like "Come to the fair" and "Linden Lee". Free supper to follow, sandwich, biscuit and tea. Since the Queen's Coronation, the years have flown by, But such precious moments, they never will die. The Queen sadly is no more, the end of my song. Yet memories of her they will live on and on.

#### Revelation 21: 1-8

From all that we hear about Queen Elizabeth II this passage is one that she might have chosen herself for this sad occasion. For most of us it is almost like losing a family member. For her it is a journey of hope into Heaven. Elizabeth has been Queen for the whole of my life. Some of you will remember her Father and perhaps also her Grandfather, and of course most of us are aware of her Uncle and of why her Father and then she became our Sovereign.

I first saw the Queen when I as a young child when I was taken to some handwaving event in Bradford.

Later I was present when she opened the rebuilt Valley Parade Stadium in Bradford after the fire in 1985. Both she and all the Royal Family were involved in showing their deep concern to the victims and the injured from the fire. This was a feature of her personal commitment, and that of her family in times of distress and we have been reminded of her response to various tragedies over the years of her reign sometimes well reported but often under reported by the Press.

As a member of the General Synod of the Church of England I had the pleasure of seeing her in her role as Supreme Governor of the Church of England, a role that she took very seriously. I sat across from her and Prince Philip at the opening of the 2010 - 2015 General Synod and was present for her official speech to the Members of Synod as they prepared to take office. She was certainly not a token leader of the Church of England. She showed by her words of encouragement her deep faith and her love of God.

My vicar in Manningham was for a time a Queens Chaplain. He made an annual visit usually to Sandringham. He was never given an easy ride. Over lunch he had to explain his sermon. Sometimes as a preacher I can say that I am pleased when folk do not ask me to explain what I meant but I might wonder what folk heard. Both Prince Philip and the Queen listened intently to sermons and had a clear understanding of the Bible that was probably much better than my own.


Queen Elizabeth II will be much missed by the Church of England and by her people.

Revelation 21 shows a clear vision of a new creation. The Holy City of God comes down to us. We have a God who keeps his promises. God did not make the Earth and then clear off. God is making all things new. That includes today. Even as we mourn the death of our Queen, God is making all things new. That making new encompasses the hope that Queen Elizabeth often focussed on in her public addresses. Our hope is not in a place without death but is in a God whose presence erases death, erases pain and erases mourning.

As humans we cannot see what God is doing but we know that in the seasons of the year God constantly makes new around us. If we believe in Jesus, God gives us the water of life. We receive that water from him freely. God loves us all.







#### **Rudston's Recipes**



#### CURRIED PARSNIP SOUP Ingredients

40g/1½oz butter or margarine I medium onion, skinned and sliced 700g/1½lb parsnips, peeled and finely diced 5ml/1 level tsp curry powder 2½ml/½ level tsp ground cumin 1.1 litres/2pts chicken or vegetable stock Salt & pepper 150ml/5 fl oz single cream or milk (if desired) Paprika to garnish

#### Method

- Melt the butter in a large saucepan, add the onion & parsnips and fry gently for about 3 minutes
- Stir in the curry powder & cumin and cook for a further 2 minutes
- Add the stock, season and bring to the boil, then reduce the heat, cover and simmer for about 45 minutes until the vegetables are tender
- Allow to cool slightly, then purée in a blender or food processor until smooth
- Return the purée to the pan and adjust the seasoning. Add the cream and reheat but do not boil. Serve sprinkled with paprika

#### REFRIGERATOR COOKIES Ingredients

5oz butter, softened 9oz caster sugar 8oz plain flour 1 egg, beaten Grated rind of 1 lemon

#### Method

- Heat the oven to 190°C/375°F/gas mark 5, lightly grease two baking trays
- Mix all the ingredients together to smooth dough, knead lightly, wrap in greaseproof paper and chill in the fridge for about 30 minutes
- Roll the dough into a sausage shape about 2" in diameter and wrap in greaseproof paper, twisting the ends together like a cracker. Chill in the fridge for about 30 minutes or until firm enough to slice. The dough sausage can be kept in the fridge overnight
- Unwrap the dough and cut into slices about ¼" thick, place on the prepared tray and bake for 12-15 minutes until golden. Lift off the trays and cool on a wire rack


