
RUDSTON VILLAGE HALL

Wow, what a year - this has been our best ever! After covering the running costs and paying out all the winnings, the bingo has raised a fantastic £1200 for the Playing Field.

I know I say this every year, but it would not be possible without the continued support of everyone who plays as well as the people who give their time every week in all weathers to deliver the tickets and collect any subs . Thank you to all of you.

Whilst it may not seem very exciting or appealing to some people, the village bingo has raised a lot of money for the benefit of everyone who lives in the village over the 40+ years that it's been running. And with a jackpot of £40 per game to be shared between all the winners, you're not going to be able to retire on your winnings.

But having said that, the value of the monies raised for whichever group receives the yearly profits is far greater. Knowing that additional monies are going to be paid to a group, be it the playing field, the village hall or even the newsletter, takes away some of the financial pressure that every group feels in trying to keep all the various facilities running, especially in the current financial situation.

Unfortunately it's not possible for me to call at everyone's door to ask if you would like to support the bingo, but if you're reading this and thinking you would like to support the village in this way, then please give me a call on 420708.

It only costs 10p per book per week to play village bingo (maximum 10 books - £1 per week) and in return we'll deliver a ticket to you every week, either in paper form, or by email if you prefer. Most games are won on week 4, although sometimes it can just be week 3. As well as the £40 jackpot, there is also the opportunity of winning £50 if you have the first 5 numbers on one book - known as the snowball numbers.

All you have to do is tick your numbers off - if you get a full house, or even better, all the snowball numbers, you just need to post your winning ticket at the address given on the slip and wait to see what you win. It's a little bit of fun that does a lot of good for Rudston.

RUDSTON HISTORY

The Rudston Monolith: A Standing Testament to Ancient Mysteries

The Rudston Monolith, a towering stone sentinel standing amidst the picturesque landscape of the East Riding of Yorkshire, England, is a mysterious and enigmatic monument that has intrigued and fascinated archaeologists, historians, and curious visitors for centuries. This massive, upright stone, known locally as the Rudston Monolith or the Rudston Stone, is one of the largest megaliths in the British Isles, and its origins and purpose have been the subject of much speculation and research.

- **Boundary Marker:** In some cases, megaliths like the Rudston Monolith were placed as boundary markers to delineate territory or to mark important routes. Given its size, it would have been an imposing marker, visible from a considerable distance.
- **Cultural Symbolism:** The stone's unique location and size might also have made it a symbol of power or significance for the ancient communities in the region. It could have represented the authority or prestige of a particular group or individual.

Transport and Construction: One of the most intriguing aspects of the Rudston Monolith is how it was transported and erected. Moor Grit, the stone from which it is made, is not found in the immediate vicinity of Rudston, which means that it had to be transported from a considerable distance. The method of transportation and the tools used in its construction remain subjects of debate and investigation. Some researchers believe that a combination of rollers, sledges, and manpower was likely employed in the monolith's transportation, while others speculate about the possible use of waterways for part of the journey.

Preservation and Significance: Despite its antiquity, the Rudston Monolith stands remarkably well-preserved and has become an important cultural and historical landmark in the East Riding of Yorkshire. It is protected as a scheduled ancient monument, and the area surrounding it has been designated as a conservation zone to ensure its continued preservation.

Visitor Experience: Today, the Rudston Monolith attracts tourists, history enthusiasts, and curious visitors from around the world. The site offers a unique opportunity to stand in the presence of an ancient marvel and ponder the mysteries of our distant past. Surrounding the monolith is the beautiful All Saints' Church, which is built from the same Moor Grit stone and further adds to the sense of historical significance in the area.



Rudston's Recipes

PUMPKIN SOUP Ingredients

1 medium-sized pumpkin (about 3-4lbs) 1 onion, chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced 2 tablespoons olive oil 4 cups vegetable or chicken broth 1 tsp ground cinnamon 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg Salt and pepper to taste 1/2 cup heavy cream (optional) Pumpkin seeds and fresh parsley for garnish

Method

- Preheat your oven to 375°F (190°C). Cut the pumpkin in half, scoop out the seeds and fibres, and brush the cut sides with olive oil. Place the pumpkin halves cut side down on a baking sheet and roast for about 45-60 minutes, or until the flesh is tender.
- Allow the roasted pumpkin to cool, then scoop out the flesh and set it aside.
- In a large pot, heat the remaining olive oil over medium heat. Add the chopped onion and garlic and sauté until they become translucent and fragrant.
- Add the roasted pumpkin flesh, ground cinnamon, ground nutmeg, salt & pepper to the pot. Stir to combine the ingredients.
- Pour in the vegetable or chicken broth and bring the mixture to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer for about 20-30 minutes, allowing the flavours to blend together.
- Use an blender to puree the soup until smooth.
- If desired, stir in the heavy cream to make the soup extra creamy and rich. Adjust the seasoning to taste.
- Serve the pumpkin soup hot, garnished with pumpkin seeds and fresh parsley. You can also drizzle a little extra cream on top for added decadence.

Rudston's Recipes (continued)

APPLE CRISP

Ingredients

6 cups of thinly sliced, peeled apples (such as Granny Smith or Honeycrisp) 1 tbsp lemon juice 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1 tsp ground cinnamon 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1/2 cup rolled oats 1/2 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup cold butter, cubed Vanilla ice cream or whipped cream (optional, for serving)

Method

- Preheat your oven to 350°F (175°C).
- In a large bowl, toss the sliced apples with lemon juice, granulated sugar, ground cinnamon, and ground nutmeg. Transfer the apple mixture to a greased 9 x 13-inch baking dish.
- In another bowl, combine the all-purpose flour, rolled oats and brown sugar. Add the cubed cold butter and use a pastry cutter or your fingers to work the butter into the dry ingredients until you have a crumbly mixture.
- Sprinkle the crumbly mixture evenly over the apples in the baking dish.
- Bake the apple crisp in the preheated oven for about 40-45 minutes or until the topping is golden brown and the apples are tender and bubbling.
- Remove the apple crisp from the oven and let it cool slightly before serving.
- Serve warm, optionally topped with a scoop of vanilla ice cream or a dollop of whipped cream for extra indulgence.



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
