

The following article was written by John Harland, son of Shirley and the late Bob Harland of Rudston.

It appeared in the winter edition of The Spokesman which is the magazine for the Bygone Bykes (Yorkshire) Club.

South Riding was Winifred's last book and has been televised several times.

The South Riding? ride - 9th July 2023.

Five members of the club met at Kilham church for a 22 mile ride themed around Winifred Holtby, author of South Riding, who was born in nearby Rudston. She sadly died at the age of 37, in 1935, and is buried in the churchyard.

Setting off at 11:00 hours the day was overcast but pleasantly warm as we headed out on country lanes to Rudston, Burton Fleming, Wold Newton and our lunch stop at Hunmanby. We sat in the Market Place, near the war memorial, and enjoyed a picnic lunch. At this point the sun came out and stayed with us for the rest of the ride.

After a walk up a short but steep hill we made our way to Argham and back to Rudston. I had arranged to visit Rudston House, birth place of Winifred Holtby, which is owned by Simon and Angela Dawson to hopefully take a couple of pictures of the bicycles outside the house. We were made so welcome and Angela had laid out books, written by Winifred, along with some photographs and gave us a really interesting talk about the author's early life in the village. We were then invited to wander through the gardens with our hosts showing us various points of interest and finally onto decking, overlooking the landscape that Winifred would have seen from her bedroom window, where we were plied with cold lemonade and biscuits. What a fantastic surprise for all of us this part of the ride was.

Having said our goodbyes we went up to the church to view Winifred's grave, Roman artefacts, the Grade I listed church and of course the 25 feet high Neolithic monolith, believed to be the largest single standing stone in the UK.

A short ride of 3 miles took us back to our start point at Kilham for around 16:30 hours. A nice gentle ride with lovely weather, no mechanical problems, great company and the hospitality given by Simon and Angela what more could you ask for?

Letter to the Newsletter Team

During November last year, the Newsletter Team received a letter from Joy Fleetham who lives in Bridlington and who has been a member of Rudston Church Choir for 20 years. Unfortunately we'd just printed the newsletters the day before and therefore couldn't include this article in the December/January edition:-.

Joy had felt moved enough to write to the Newsletter Team to let us know that the Remembrance service held at Rudston Cenotaph, and attended by 23 people, was lovely. She went on to write that during the wars, many animals played an important part in helping the armed forces, be that carrying equipment and supplies as well as carrying messages back from the front to headquarters.

Joy had noted that when all the wreaths were laid around the Cenotaph in London, there was no recognition for all these animals, however at our service in Rudston a lady did lay a wreath in acknowledgement of the part that they played. Joy wanted to pass on her thanks to this person, whoever she was.

There are different coloured poppies used to commemorate remembrance, red being the colour we know most as a symbol of both Remembrance and hope for a peaceful future. It is worn as a show of support for the Armed Forces community. But some of us may not know that a purple poppy is worn to honour animals, such as the horses, mules, donkeys, dogs and pigeons who were also victims of war.



RUDSTON DURING WORLD WAR II

During WWII the Bridlington area was important in the defence effort. The open beaches and flat landing made the area vulnerable to German invasion from sea and air. British Troops were posted here and the area around Rudston base for training tank regiments. There are many structures and features across the landscape which show just how big a part it played.

Evidence of air attacks are visible in the bomb crater in the field near the Burton Fleming Road and the Church. The damage caused to the Church is as a result of bombs which were believed to have been aimed at Thorpe Hall (then Divisional HQ). The water reservoir supplied the troops that were stationed in Rudston. Perhaps the most intriguing landmark is the virtually unknown Out Station, again near Burton Fleming Road. These were hidden bunkers used by the Auxiliary Units to relay intelligence to Army HQ's and as a base to perform special operations. The previous information was taken from the Heritage Centre in All Saints Church, Rudston. For more information about these and other significant sites, please pop into the Church.

Like other areas of the UK, Rudston was affected by the evacuation of children and vulnerable individuals from cities and towns threatened by bombing raids. Many children from cities like Hull and London were sent to live with host families in villages like Rudston to keep them safe from air raids. One of my relatives, Margaret Drewery, was evacuated with her mother to Rudston from Hull. Margaret's mother helped at the local school and then moved into number 5 Nightingale Row when it was first built.


The Riding's largely remote location and rural economy made it favourable for the holding of enemy prisoners of war. There were camps at Welton, Goole, Bishop Burton, Rudston and West Cowick. The first POWs held in Britain were German pilots, aircrew and naval personnel however these were only small in number. The first major influx of enemy prisoners occurred in July 1941 when Italians captured in the Middle East arrived on British shores.

The PoW Camp in Rudston is believed to have consisted of two Nissen huts connected by a brick work passageway and structure with evidence of a previous hut also being connected via a brick structure. In addition, there is a single isolated Nissen Hut at 90° to the other structures. This arrangement of the brick and Nissen Huts is a classic small accommodation unit as used by the British Military in WWII. An identical structure is to be found at PoW Camp 1007 Site.

Rudston's Recipes

CREAM OF VEGETABLE SOUP

Ingredients Butter - about 1 oz 2 medium sized onions, peeled and chopped 4 large carrots, peeled, trimmed and thickly sliced 4 sticks of celery, wiped and sliced 6 florets of cauliflower 1 courgette wiped, trimmed and thickly sliced - don't peel Chicken stock cube 1½ oz butter ¾ pint milk - the milk & butter should be cold from the fridge 1 oz plain flour Salt & pepper to taste

Method

- Melt the butter in a pan, add the onions and cook gently until soft but not browned
- Add the other vegetables, shake the pan, cover and cook gently for a few minutes
- Add about 1½ pints of boiling water with the stock cube dissolved
- Cover the pan, bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer gently until the vegetables are soft
- Put the milk, butter and flour in a pan over a gentle heat, mix with a balloon or wire whisk. Once the butter has melted increase the heat a little and stir with a wooden spoon until the mixture is thickened
- Allow the vegetables in stock and the thickened milk to cool a little
- Mix the vegetables in stock with the thickened milk and blend (I find a stick blender is good for this). Don't over blend, allow the soup to keep a bit of texture
- Season with salt & pepper, you should not need much salt

TIPS:

Use whatever vegetables you have; this is a good soup to use up oddments! I have tried using fresh stock but it seems to work better with a stock cube, I like Knorr.

WINTER VEGETABLE STEW

Ingredients

1 tablespoon olive oil 1 onion, chopped 2 cloves garlic, minced 2 carrots, peeled and diced 2 parsnips, peeled and diced 2 potatoes, peeled and diced 1 cup butternut squash, diced 4 cups vegetable broth 1 can (14 oz) diced tomatoes 1 teaspoon dried thyme 1 teaspoon dried rosemary Salt and pepper to taste 1 cup kale, chopped 1 can (15 oz) cannellini beans, drained and rinsed

Method

- In a large pot, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Add the onion and garlic, sauté until softened.
- Add the carrots, parsnips, potatoes, and butternut squash. Cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- Pour in the vegetable broth and diced tomatoes. Add thyme, rosemary, salt, and pepper. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to simmer for 20-25 minutes or until the vegetables are tender.
- Stir in the kale and cannellini beans, cook for an additional 5 minutes until the kale is wilted and the beans are heated through.
- Adjust seasoning if necessary and serve hot. Optionally, garnish with fresh herbs.

CHOCOLATE COVERED STRAWBERRY SMOOTHIE

Ingredients

1 cup frozen strawberries 1 banana 1 cup milk (dairy or plant-based)

- 2 tablespoons cocoa powder
- 1 tablespoon honey or maple syrup

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Ice cubes (optional)

Method

- In a blender, combine frozen strawberries, banana, milk, cocoa powder, honey or maple syrup, and vanilla extract.
- Blend on high until smooth and creamy. If the consistency is too thick, you can add more milk.
- If desired, add ice cubes and blend again until the smoothie reaches your preferred thickness.
- Taste and adjust sweetness if needed by adding more honey or maple syrup.
- Pour into a glass and enjoy your delicious chocolate covered strawberry smoothie!

Monthly Gardening Calendar – February Jobs



- Review and plan your garden layout for the year.
- Order seeds and plan your seed-starting schedule for later in the season.
- If the ground isn't frozen, consider adding organic matter like compost to your soil.
- Mulch garden beds to protect soil structure and reduce weed growth.
- Prune fruit trees and grapevines (if dormant in your region).
- Remove dead or diseased branches from trees and shrubs.
- Clean and sharpen gardening tools. This includes pruners, shears and hoes.
- Check indoor plants for pests and diseases.
- Adjust watering schedules for indoor plants based on their winter needs.
- If you have a greenhouse or cold frame, start planning and preparing for early seed sowing.
- Continue composting kitchen scraps and yard waste.
- Inspect garden beds for signs of overwintering pests or eggs.
- Keep bird feeders filled to attract birds to your garden. They can help control pests.
- Cut back and clean up dead foliage from perennial plants.
- If you experience frost, cover tender plants with frost cloth or burlap at night.


