IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT ACCESSING TRANSPORT FOR APPOINTMENTS AND/OR SHOPPING

The MediBus services provide residents of the East Riding of Yorkshire with transport from their front door to local hospitals, doctors' surgeries, clinics and dentists. Passengers can also use the service for visiting friends and relatives in hospital. All the vehicles used on the service are wheelchair-accessible.

Please Note: the MediBus Service is a different service from the NHS-provided Passenger Transport Service. The MediBus is operated by a single driver and if you require assistance at the hospital, it would be advisable to travel with a companion.

You must book your journey in advance and bookings are taken on a first come, first served basis.

How do I book? To book a journey on the MediBus service contact the dedicated MediBus:

Call 03456 445959, 9am-4pm Monday to Thursday and 9am-3.30pm Friday (excluding bank holidays).

Alternatively, you can email the details of the journey you require, including your contact details. Email: passengerbookings@eastriding.gov.uk

Once your booking has been accepted and confirmed the driver will call you the night before to advise you of your approximate pickup time. You will be picked up from your home address. Please be ready a few minutes before the time the driver gives you.

How much does it cost? Concessionary bus pass holders and disabled bus pass holders can use their bus pass on MediBus services.

Adult without any type of bus pass - single ticket £5, return ticket £10 Concessionary / Disabled pass holders - single ticket £2.50, return ticket £5 Passenger assistant or a carer - no charge to use MediBus services Child under the age of 16 - no charge to use MediBus services



HART offers a door-to-door service to local market towns and supermarkets serving most villages in Holderness and the East Coastal Wolds. Fares are £5.00 return for those of bus pass age or £10.00 full fare. To book a seat ring 01964 536684.

Rudston's Recipes

BALSAMIC STRAWBERRY BRUSCHETTA

Ingredients

For the Balsamic Glaze

1 cup balsamic vinegar 2 tbsps honey (or maple syrup for vegan option)

For the Bruschetta

1 French baguette, sliced into ½ inch thick pieces
1 lb fresh strawberries, diced
½ cup fresh basil leaves, thinly sliced
8 ozs fresh mozzarella cheese, sliced (optional for added richness)
Olive oil, for brushing
Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste

Method

Prepare the Balsamic Glaze

- In a small saucepan, combine the balsamic vinegar and honey (or maple syrup) over medium heat.
- Bring the mixture to a simmer, then reduce the heat to low. Allow it to simmer gently for about 10-15 minutes, stirring occasionally, until the mixture is thickened and reduced by about half. It should coat the back of a spoon.
- Remove from heat and let it cool. The glaze will continue to thicken as it cools.

Prepare the Bruschetta

- Preheat your grill or oven to medium-high heat.
- Brush the sliced baguette with olive oil on both sides. Grill or toast the bread slices until lightly golden and crisp, about 2-3 minutes per side. If using the oven, place the slices on a baking sheet and bake at 375°F (190°C) for about 8-10 minutes, flipping halfway through.
- Once toasted, optionally rub the top side of each slice with a clove of garlic for added flavour.

Assemble the Bruschetta

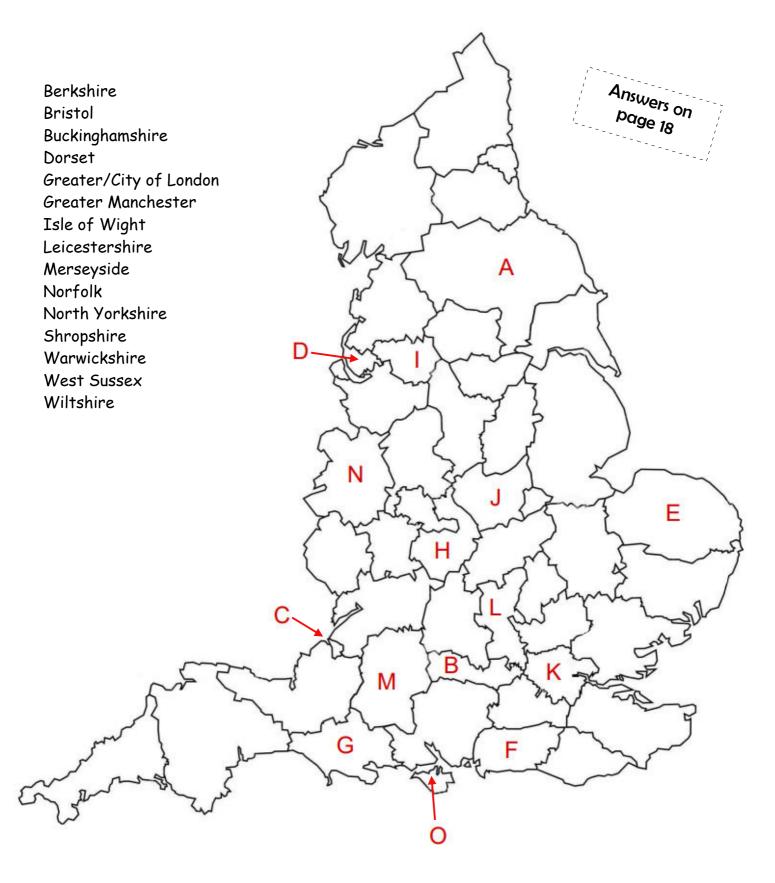
- Arrange the toasted baguette slices on a serving platter.
- Top each slice with a slice of fresh mozzarella cheese (if using).
- In a bowl, combine the diced strawberries and sliced basil. Season lightly with salt and pepper.
- Spoon the strawberry-basil mixture over the cheese-topped baguette slices.

Finish with Balsamic Glaze

- Drizzle the prepared balsamic glaze generously over the strawberry-basil topped bruschetta.
- Serve immediately as an appetizer or light snack.

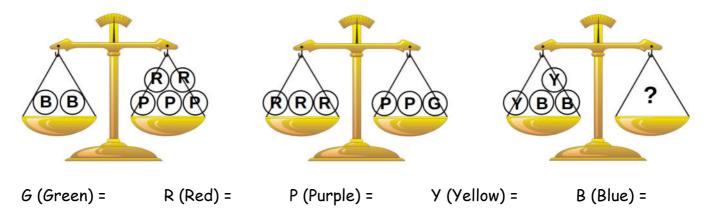

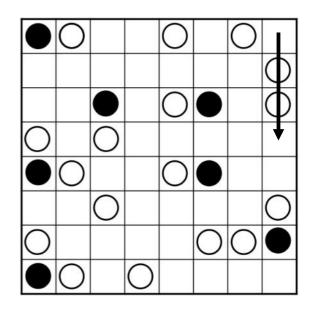

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Monthly Gardening Calendar - May Jobs

1. Planting:

May is a prime time for planting a wide range of flowers, vegetables, and herbs. Ensure the soil is warm enough and free from frost risks before planting tender annuals and vegetables.

2. Weeding:

With the warmer weather, weeds proliferate rapidly. Regularly weed your garden beds to prevent them from competing with your desired plants for nutrients and space.

3. Watering:

As the weather warms up, plants require more water. Water deeply and less frequently to encourage deep root growth. Be mindful of newly planted seeds and seedlings, as they may require more frequent watering until they establish themselves.

4. Mulching:

Apply mulch around plants to retain soil moisture, suppress weeds and regulate soil temperature. Organic mulches such as bark chips, straw or compost also add nutrients to the soil as they break down.

5. Fertilizing:

Provide nutrients to your plants by fertilizing them as needed. Follow the specific requirements of each plant type and avoid over-fertilizing, which can harm plants and pollute waterways.

6. Pruning:

May is a good time for pruning shrubs and trees to shape them and encourage healthy growth. Remove dead or damaged branches, as well as any suckers or unwanted growth.

7. Supporting:

Stake or provide support for tall or heavy plants, such as tomatoes, peas or flowering perennials, to prevent them from bending or breaking under their own weight.

8. Pest and Disease Control:

Monitor your garden for signs of pests and diseases, such as aphids, fungal infections or plant diseases. Take appropriate measures to control them, whether through natural predators, organic sprays or cultural practices.

9. Harvesting:

If you planted early crops, you may start harvesting some vegetables like lettuce, spinach, radishes and peas in May. Harvesting regularly encourages plants to produce more.

10. Planning for Summer:

Take some time to plan for the upcoming summer months. Consider what plants you'd like to grow, any changes you want to make to your garden layout and any tasks you need to schedule.
