

The following article is by a lady who wanted to pass on her memories of the Second World War to her great grandchildren. As far as we could, we have kept the memories as they have been written.

WARTIME MEMORIES (Part 1) by Doris Sugden

My name is Doris Elizabeth Sugden. I was born on August 13th 1910 at 13 Gladstone Terrace, Morley, Nr Leeds in the West Riding of Yorkshire. My father was a woollen manufacturer and during the first world war he made blankets and other things for the Army. He had two brothers, Herbert and Arthur, they were all in the partnership. My father and Herbert were too old to go into the Army but Arthur was called up. He came home safely at the end of the war.

When my father retired we moved to Bridlington. The house we lived in was 68 Cardigan Road, next door to Emmanuel Church. It had ten rooms and cost £2,000. When my father died in 1947 it was sold for £3,750. In 1997 it was up for sale for the price of £119,000 - that gives you an idea of how the value of money has changed since the war. (According to Zoopla, it was sold again in February 2003 for £230,000!).

I met Harold Denis Rogers when I was a schoolgirl, 16 years old, and still at school. We remained friends and became engaged when we were both 21. We were married on 22nd June 1935 at Emmanuel Church and our daughter Jill Denise was born on 9th September 1937. Harold had started his own business as a building contractor and had built several chalets at Flamborough and houses in Bridlington, including the bungalow we lived in - 26 Kingsgate. Life was everything we could have asked for.

There were rumours of war but we did not think it would happen, but Harold joined the Territorial Army (The Green Howards) and went on manoeuvres to learn about becoming a soldier. We were dancing at the Spa Royal Hall one evening when the announcement was made that war had been declared against Germany.

We all had to have our houses completely blacked out so that no light could be seen during the hours of darkness. At first we had plywood shutters made for the windows and doors but these weren't satisfactory, so I had to buy thick black material and line all the curtains. I only had one visit from the Air Raid Warden to tell me I was showing a light.

We didn't have any air raids for a time and life went on as normal except that there were no lights in the streets; it was completely dark. Car lights had to be partly covered so they showed very little light and we had to use torches if we went out at night.

Harold was called up immediately because he and some of our friends were in the territorials. He went in as a Corporal and for a time he was able to live at home but

then he was sent to camp. Sometimes he was allowed home for a couple of days. His Army pay at this time was £1.9s a week but after a short while he was promoted to a Sergeant with three stripes and his pay was increased a little. At this time I was in partnership with my sister Gwen; we had a hairdressing salon in Quay Road, opposite Lloyds Hospital. My wage was £2.10s a week and I had little savings, so with my army pay I had very little to live on.

Harold's business premises were on lease and after it was closed, I expected to be relieved of the rent but the owners would not agree so I had to pay over £2.00 a week which made it very hard for me. However in the first of the bombing raids it had a direct hit and was destroyed, so I didn't have to pay any more, but, although it was a big help for me, it was also very sad for several people who were killed at the same time.

When the bombing started it continued and there were not many nights when we did not hear the sound of German planes passing over, very soon we were able to tell the different sounds of the Germans and our own fighter planes. The reason we had so much activity over the town was because the Germans used Flamborough Head as a marker. The planes passed over on their way to industrial towns, but unfortunately for Bridlington any bombs they had left were dropped on the town before the planes left the coast for home, resulting in a lot of air raid warnings and a great deal of damage.

Wherever possible people had air raid shelters. I had the flower bed in my front garden dug out about six feet and it was lined with timber. We had a mattress laid and when the sirens sounded we went into it. We had an electric light but the worst part of it was watching the woodlice and other insects moving about. Unfortunately we had some very wet weather and the shelter flooded so we had to abandon it.

We replaced the garden shelter with a strong metal one in the dining room. This was like a big metal table just large enough to take a mattress and when necessary we slept in there. I was told later that if a bomb had fallen on the house we would have been squashed as the wooden floor would have given way, however we felt safe at the time so it was a good thing.

We had some very bad bombs and on one occasion it was in the summer and I had all the windows open in the sun lounge. I forgot to shut them before Jill went to bed and as I did not want to disturb her I went outside and pushed them to close them. During the night a 1000lb bomb was dropped very close (on the corner of St Johns Avenue and Bessingby Road). All the windows blew open; if they had been locked properly they would all have broken. I was very frightened for Jill and I wondered what I would find when I went into her room. She was sleeping quite safely and hadn't heard a thing. The next morning when I went outside I found all the tiles on the north side of the house had slipped down the roof and some of them had broken. It was a bit too close for comfort. To be continued

Rudston's Recipes

ASPARAGUS & GOAT CHEESE TART

Ingredients

For the Tart

1 sheet of puff pastry, thawed if frozen 1 bunch of asparagus, tough ends trimmed 4 oz's goat cheese, softened 2 tbsps grated Parmesan cheese 2 tbsps olive oil 2 cloves garlic, minced Salt & pepper to taste

For the Garnish

Fresh herbs (such as chives or parsley), chopped Lemon zest (optional)

Method

- Preheat your oven to 400°F (200°C).
- In a medium-sized bowl, toss the trimmed asparagus spears with olive oil, minced garlic, salt and pepper until evenly coated.
- Roll out the puff pastry sheet on a lightly floured surface into a rectangle or circle, depending on your preference then transfer the pastry to a baking sheet lined with parchment paper.
- Using a sharp knife, score a border about 1 inch from the edge of the pastry, being careful not to cut all the way through. This will create a border that will puff up during baking. Prick the centre of the pastry inside the border with a fork to prevent it from puffing up too much.
- Spread the softened goat cheese evenly over the centre of the pastry, within the border. Arrange the marinated asparagus spears on top of the goat cheese in a single layer. Sprinkle grated Parmesan cheese over the asparagus.
- Place the assembled tart in the preheated oven and bake for 20-25 minutes or until the pastry is golden brown and puffed up around the edges, and the asparagus is tender.
- Once baked, remove the tart from the oven and let it cool slightly.
- Garnish with chopped fresh herbs and lemon zest, if desired, for a pop of freshness.
- Slice and serve the tart warm or at room temperature as a savoury appetizer or light meal.

Rudston's Recipes (continued)

STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE

Ingredients

For the Shortcake

2 cups all-purpose flour
¼ cup granulated sugar
1 tbsp baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup cold unsalted butter, cut into small pieces
⅔ cup milk
1 tsp vanilla extract

For the Strawberries

1lb fresh strawberries,hulled & sliced2-3 tbsp granulated sugar(adjust to taste)Whipped cream, for serving

Method

- Preheat your oven to 425°F (220°C). Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or lightly grease it.
- In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt.
- Add the cold butter pieces to the dry ingredients. Use a pastry cutter or your fingertips to cut the butter into the flour mixture until it resembles coarse crumbs.
- In a separate small bowl, mix together the milk and vanilla extract. Gradually pour the milk mixture into the flour mixture, stirring until the dough just comes together.
- Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured surface and gently knead it a few times until it forms a smooth ball. Be careful not to overwork the dough.
- Pat the dough out to a thickness of about ¾ inch. Use a round biscuit cutter or glass to cut out circles of dough. Place the dough circles onto the prepared baking sheet, spacing them a couple of inches apart.
- Bake the shortcakes in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes, or until they are lightly golden brown. Remove from the oven and allow them to cool slightly on a wire rack.
- While the shortcakes are baking, prepare the strawberries. In a mixing bowl, combine the sliced strawberries with the granulated sugar. Stir well to coat the strawberries evenly, then let them sit at room temperature for about 15-20 minutes to macerate and release their juices.
- To serve, split the cooled shortcakes in half horizontally. Place the bottom halves on serving plates and top each with a generous spoonful of the macerated strawberries. Add a dollop of whipped cream, then place the top halves of the shortcakes over the strawberries and cream.
- Garnish with additional strawberries or mint leaves, if desired. Serve immediately and enjoy!



- 1. Watering: With the weather warming up, plants will require more frequent watering. Check soil moisture regularly and water deeply as needed, preferably in the early morning or late afternoon to minimise evaporation.
- 2. Weeding: Keep on top of weeds by regularly pulling them or using mulch to suppress their growth. Weeds can quickly take over if left unchecked.
- 3. Mulching: Apply a layer of mulch around plants to help retain moisture, suppress weeds and regulate soil temperature. This becomes especially important as temperatures rise in June.
- 4. Harvesting: Many fruits and vegetables will be ready for harvest in June. Check your garden regularly for ripe produce and harvest promptly to encourage continued production.
- 5. Pruning: Continue to prune spring-flowering shrubs and trees if needed. Remove any dead or diseased branches and shape plants as desired. Avoid heavy pruning during hot weather to minimize stress on plants.
- 6. Fertilizing: If you haven't already fertilised your plants, consider doing so in early June. Choose a balanced fertiliser or one specifically formulated for the type of plants you're growing and follow application instructions carefully.
- 7. Pest and Disease Control: Keep an eye out for pests & diseases in your garden and take appropriate action to control them. This may include hand-picking pests, applying organic sprays or using other integrated pest management techniques.
- 8. Supporting: As plants continue to grow, provide support as needed to prevent them from flopping over. Install stakes, cages or trellises for tall or vining plants and tie up any floppy stems.
- 9. Deadheading: Remove spent flowers from plants to encourage continued blooming and prevent seed formation. This can help prolong the flowering season and keep your garden looking tidy.
- 10. Transplanting: If you have any remaining seedlings or need to move plants to different locations, June is a good time to do so. Water transplants thoroughly after planting to help them establish roots.
- 11. Garden Cleanup: Remove any debris, dead foliage or spent plants from your garden beds to reduce the risk of pests and diseases. Keeping the garden clean also improves its appearance.
- 12. Planning and Maintenance: Take some time to assess your garden's performance so far and make plans for any changes or improvements you'd like to implement. Regular maintenance tasks such as sharpening tools and repairing equipment sho addressed.


