I would like to wish all the residents of Rudston a merry Christmas and a happy New Year.





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Gardening Corner

Here we are again, another year to look forward to. Each Christmas I am reminded of one or two special jobs that I helped with, when I was a very young garden boy. Flowers and a few flowering pot plants, for the church here at Rudston, all growing in the glass houses at Thorpe. The other job was the cutting of holly for decoration and for the shop in Bridlington. How the years fly by! Work outdoors meant winter digging and pruning of fruit trees also grape vines in the vinery.

Any planting is done if the weather is suitable, but there is always something to do in the glass house, cleaning thoroughly ready for the new year seed sowing etc. For those giant onions, now is the time to sow in a little heat. I do like those giant bulbs, so mild and good in the kitchen.



This month, after apples and pears, it's the turn of plums. The variety that most folk know is "Victoria", very reliable and often heavy croppers. It does well in our thin chalky soil. There are about 400 varieties in the plum family, so no shortage to choose from. These days most growers plant plums that have been grafted or budded onto a dwarf root stock: so if you are going to plant, the root stock "Pixie" is the best.

All varieties including damsons are shallow rooting, compared with apples and pears, so use plenty of organic manure when preparing the soil. My choice of varieties include, Victoria, Marjorie's Seedling, Czar, Kirke's Blue and the transparent Gage. Merryweather is a large fruiting damson and is always worth a place in the orchard.

My last monthly notes are at an end but I do hope we have a successful 2016 in our gardens and hope to keep in good health for a long time. Best wishes to all our readers.




Tuesday 1st December. Christmas Bingo at Ferns Farm Hotel, Carnaby. Eyes down 7.30pm

Spoke too soon! First the Fly Tippers struck again, this time leaving black bags of assorted household rubbish, and (surprisingly) one of garden rubbish, in front of the recycling containers. That means they were in full view, as well as causing difficulty for those visiting with bottles etc. The Paper container was still in place then, but both that and the Plastics have gone now. Thank you to those who continued to use them to the end. If the County Council take notice of such things, it will show that they will be missed by some people at least. Payments seem to be catching up again now, as figures for July to September have just been received, ironically showing two collections of paper against one of glass.

The other thing unwisely mentioned last month was crime. That was fortunately of a minor nature, but suffice to say that our PCSO had occasion to call at a house in the village. Let's hope I don't inadvertently invite trouble this month!

East Riding of Yorkshire Council's "Overview & Scrutiny Committee" are inviting the public as well as parish councils to suggest any topics for the Council, NHS, Police, or Fire & Rescue, to consider. As a guide, this year they have looked at: school buildings & funding, potholes, controlled parking, special expenses, council assets, drug use, maternity & cancer services, road safety, sheltered housing. This committee can produce recommendations and reports and offer advice, but stress that it is NOT a forum for complaints or planning application matters. Anyone with non-complaining suggestions can e-mail: scrutiny@eastriding.gov.uk or phone: 01482 393204. There is a deadline of 8th January, 2016.

That is not expected to be the subject of a separate agenda item at the meeting on 9th December, but of course if anyone has anything which they think might be better coming from the parish council, please contact any member before then.

There may then have been another meeting before the next newsletter, as that should be late January or early February.

As you will see from the separate notice, the parish council and its dog warden are prepared to get tough over the dog fouling matter. It seems amazing that despite numerous articles, both national and local, there are some people who just will not clean up after their dog. After a distressing case in front of the village hall in late October, we must assume that one or two of them live in the village. If they have a compelling reason for not complying, maybe they would explain to Mr. Shanks?

Another parish council member has taken up the local bus service issue. Please take the trouble to respond to the survey arranged by Mrs. Starkey if you do, or could, use local transport. This could have a bearing on the County Council's proposals for next year, as outlined in October. However, attention to this matter has also brought up news from Nafferton MiBus that no-one from Rudston has actually used the Tuesday "dial-a-ride" service since that was set up in early 2014. Indeed, their present co-ordinator denied any arrangement being in place at all, so that could be awkward if anyone fancies it now.

As always at this time of year, on behalf of the Parish Council: Best Wishes for Christmas and the New Year to all. (Including the anti-social types mentioned above, if they change their ways!)

***** **Anniversaries** *****

There seem to have been a large number of anniversaries this year, many of 50 years ago, and here are a few more.

Looking back now, 1965 could be described as a troubled time. Strikes and “go-slows” were common-place. A chap called Beeching had taken an axe to the railways, amid government enthusiasm for cars and motorways. America had a war in Vietnam, and the Cold War with Russia gave an uneasy feeling about a button being pressed by one of them, spelling the end of the world as we knew it.

So maybe it was light relief when we were told that a golden eagle, swiftly named “Goldie”, had escaped from London Zoo. Attempts at recapture were reported daily, and it took a week before the eagle was eventually lured back none the worse for its exploits. (Not sure about the local small bird population!)

Some of the strikes were interesting though. On the London Tube booking clerks called a one day strike and an “honesty box” was placed at stations with passengers invited to leave their normal fare. We don't know how successful that was, but at least the trains were running that time. A “go-slow” on the national network later in the year actually led to fisticuffs between drivers and passengers.

The B.B.C. were not immune, and to add to their troubles star presenter Richard Dimbleby let slip a swear word on “Panorama”. It would have begun with “B” of course - “F” would have had them closed down! He was quickly forgiven, having given his usual polished commentary for the funeral of Sir Winston Churchill in January. Sadly, he himself died of cancer just before Christmas that year.

In football, Stanley Matthews played his final first division game at the age of 50 in February. At the end of the year, Hull City had a record crowd of 40,000 at Boothferry Park for a Boxing Day match against Millwall. That was 27th December, the 26th having been a Sunday. Sundays were still “special” in those days, when there was little professional sport, and only some small shops open.

At least this was the golden age of popular music, even if we didn't realise it at the time. The Beatles were already being awarded M.B.E.s, causing disgust and the returning of medals from others. The Rolling Stones were living up to their “bad boy” image, and a magistrate called them “morons”. That was a new word to some of their more uneducated followers, who thought it would make a good name for a new group! (Which is what pop bands were called then).

The Royal Family had its own troublesome one. Princess Margaret's husband, Anthony Armstrong-Jones, rode a motor-bike, but there was disapproval in some quarters when she was photographed on the pillion. A princess in full leathers astride a motor bike? Tut-tut!

1965 saw the abolition of hanging. Contrary to speculation, or wishful thinking, the rope was not replaced by the guillotine or anything. A newspaper columnist did suggest that “aged and infirm” members of the House of Lords should be “put down” though!

America and Russia were also involved in a “space race” to reach the moon. There was endless speculation as to what they might find when they got there, with little green men being a favourite.

As Benny Hill sang: “What a world, what a place, ain't you glad you're a member of the human race”.


