

We have had a busy autumn term, as usual, here at school. We have been working with a new rota of weekly themes in school to give us a focus for Collective Worship and for our new rewards system. The children have really responded well to our new rewards system, with 2 children from each class (as well as one child chosen by the lunchtime staff) being given the 'VIP' award during Friday's 'Achievement Assembly'. Thanks to Charlie Richardson and Jane for again providing a Christmas Tree for Church.



Rudston Heritage History Group

On the 24th November John Walker gave the History Group a fascinating presentation on Queen Henrietta Maria and Bridlington.

Queen Henrietta Maria was the wife of King Charles I. In early 1643, having raised funds and bought munitions on the continent to support her husband's cause Henrietta Maria returned to England. She landed in Bridlington and stayed at a house on the harbour. The parliamentarian ships which had been pursuing her bombarded the town and she was forced to flee and seek shelter in a stream bed. When she left the town she left behind a pair of gloves and a ring.

Henrietta Maria, three thousand troops and hundreds of ox carts carrying the munitions made their way inland, and stayed a night at Boynton Hall, then a night at Burton Fleming. They could travel about 9 miles in a day. Their aim was to reach the King's garrison at Malton. An enthralling talk illustrated with some very fine pictures.



The December meeting of the Group is on Thursday 15th December (not the usual 4th Thursday) when John Walker will give a short talk on the early history of Rudston and the rest of the evening will be "hands on" when your own treasures can be identified by the group's experts, and enjoyed by all. So bring along something interesting if you can. There will be seasonal refreshments.

The January meeting will be on Thursday January 26th when Rick Hudson will talk on "Lost Houses of Bridlington"

The History Group meetings are held in Rudston Village Hall at 7pm, all are welcome and admission is £2.

The defibrillator has now been delivered and we hope to have this installed by Christmas. As previously reported, this will be sited in the old phone box on Middle Street. Once the defibrillator is installed, we will set up a training session for anyone who would like to know how to use one.

Improving Urgent Care Services – Public Consultation

NHS East Riding of Yorkshire Clinical Commissioning Group has launched a 12-week formal public consultation on proposed changes to our Urgent Care services. The consultation started on 25 October and will finish on 17 January 2017. People can get involved by completing the online survey or attending one of the public drop-in events. Under the proposals, two or three Urgent Care Centres (UCCs) would replace the six Minor Injury Units currently operating across East Riding of Yorkshire. These UCCs would be open 16 hours a day, 365 days a year and provide consistent services across all the centres. Find out more at www.eastridingofyorkshireccg.nhs.uk/urgentcare

The next Parish Council meeting is to take place on 14th December 2016 at 7.30pm when the annual subject of next year's precept will be discussed, and hopefully decided.

Cats & Dogs – and Trains

When it was decided in 2003 that the Leamington Spa station cat should be “retired” due to ill health, there seemed to be some confusion as to exactly when she arrived. As a stray cat she had just appeared one day and taken a liking to the surroundings. Whether or not it was as a kitten in 1990 however, it had been established that she was now 13 years old and beginning to suffer from arthritis.

Station staff agreed that “Central”, as they had named her after their company, should no longer be expected to be chief mouser based in the staffroom, but could lead a more leisurely life in the supervisor's office. They clubbed together (raising as much as would have been expected for a human colleague) and organised a framed “retirement certificate” and specially engraved collar. A suggestion that the latter was diamond-studded may have been an exaggeration though.

No less a person than the deputy managing director of Central Trains attended to make the presentation. The resulting photograph shows a rather unimpressed looking tabby beside a decidedly more impressive framed certificate.


Two years later, in 2005, a dog in Scotland made headlines by catching a train all by itself. Archie, a black labrador, had made the short journey by train with his master from the village of Inch a few times, so when they became separated in the town of Inverurie he simply made for the station, got on a train at a familiar platform, and stepped off at the first stop 12 minutes later, which was his home station. An extraordinary mixture of luck and animal instinct.

On the train no-one realised the dog was unaccompanied until arrival at Inch when the conductor saw him get off alone. In common with most small stations this one was unstaffed, but luckily still had a signal box. The signalman, Derek Hope, was at the platform end and able to take charge of the situation.

After signalling the train away, he unlocked a waiting room, organised a bowl of water and set about tracing the owner, a Mr. Tait. The latter was understandably amazed and relieved at a quick reunion with his pet, but quite how they became separated in the first place is not recorded.

Of course the signalman was duty-bound to log this unusual incident, and Mr. Hope's entry No. 822344 reads: “Unaccompanied doggie gets off train”.

The animal died in 2009, and while not as famous as another Scottish dog “Greyfriars Bobby”, let's hope “Archie of Inch” gets a mention in the museum now housed in the station buildings there. After all, like Tom and Barbara Good's cockerel in “The Good Life” who hopped on a bus, “he was no mug”!




