A word from Rev Barbara Hodgson (a priest, living in Burton Fleming, serving our benefices)

Dear Friends,

When I was travelling on the train to visit my mother in law in Preston Lancs, I was thinking, as one does on a train, about a different approach to Lent, this penitential season of the Christian year.

We know it is a time for us to fast, pray and give alms. It is a time for us to engage fully in an effort to diminish the gap between the peace and harmony for which we and God long and the way things are in the world.

I had read my paper and got out my jotter ready for some inspiration, when I was given a church Magazine by a man who was leaving the train at the next station. It made interesting reading. I'd like to share some of it with you, and so this Lent I invite you to join me in a kind of fasting that can help change our "hearts of stone" more fully to "hearts of flesh" (Ezekiel 36:26). Could this be a way to find the soft place in our hearts and keep calling ourselves to live from that place?

Try a fast that has little to do with food:

Fast for awareness

* Fast from a hardness of heart toward someone in your family who is difficult.

* Fast from the refusal to stand in another person's shoes.

* Fast from feeling annoyed with children.

* Fast from aggression toward earth, animals and co-workers.

* Fast from addictions that keep you from being the person God means you to be.

* Fast from thinking you are always right.

* Fast from wearing an angry face.

* Fast from being despondent about not doing as well this Lent as you hoped you would, little by little, your one heart will grow toward the peace that the world cannot give.

* Fast from being impatient with yourself. Notice when you are not fasting in these ways, and be patient with yourself. Slow down; pause before you act or speak.

This kind of fasting becomes a prayer of awareness. That prayer of awareness becomes almsgiving through which we give the gift of nonviolence, peace and harmony the gift of a heart of flesh to ourselves and to the universe.

If you are like me, fasting from food is not easy, then this might be an idea for you. We are so familiar with what we should or should not be doing in Lent that a different way of engaging with this might be beneficial.

Thoughts and Memories

Funny isn't it, how someone else's writing can spark off motivation to put pen to paper.

On reading Mr. Robinson's "Gardening Corner", February issue, it put me in mind of waxing lyrical about a particular Yew tree that my father planted in our garden in Shropshire (Clun), so here goes.

I suppose I was about ten at the time, when he arrived home with this small Yew tree plant. I can remember the looks my mum gave us all – as if to say "This will be interesting!!!" Interesting and fun it

did turn out to be, as my brother eventually (when age allowed) took over the cutting and trimming of said Yew. I have to say it is no longer just a "bush", as some fifty years ago my brother very expertly trimmed it into the shape of the Roadrunner – a popular cartoon character in our house at the time – much like a large cockerel (in excess of twelve feet in height). Our Yew became known as the "Roadrunner" amongst the locals, and was much photographed by



people passing by. As far as I am aware it still survives there today. So, you may be interested to know that my garden here at Applecross has yielded five Yews that have self-seeded, possibly from the tree in the church yard or perhaps from my neighbour's garden. Three of them are now five years old – still far too young to "play" with yet, and two are recent finds in the garden, but are now in pots ready to grow on – so if anyone wants one of these two – feel free to call.

Gardening Corner

I've watched so many cooking programmes on TV during the Christmas period, and since, that I now Feel qualified to start a new career. I must admit that I do like to see James Martin and his friends in the kitchen. Perhaps I'd better stick to the garden, although I do make a reasonable Yorkshire Pudding, but need help with that essential onion gravy.

This all reminds me that I must plant my shallots, a veg loved by cooks. There was a time when most folks grew a row of shallots.



I remember, as an apprentice, it was the custom to plant these on the shortest day and lift them on the longest. Onion sets are popular and there is a number of varieties to choose from.

Now on to potatoes, I must plant my Arram Pilots, like all varieties the best crops come from clean, virus free tubers and a well worked soil, with plenty of farmyard manure added.

March is the main sowing and planting month so one can't go far wrong by getting cracking, splitting up clumps of chives and so called Welsh onions, all useful in the Kitchen. Watch out for aphids on fruit bushes, especially on blackcurrants.

It's too early to sow French and runner beans, and tender marrow and pumpkins. I sow a few in 3" pots at the end of March or even early April, ready for planting out when the risk of frost has passed.

Get ready next month the help fruit trees in particular apple trees set their blossom, more about this in next month's edition.

Anyway keep on gardening, no need for the gym. Let's hope for a good season. Did any one see on TV where folk were buying daffodil bulbs, thinking they were onions and eating them!!

Crosslands Column



“U turns”. They are something normally associated with governments and politicians, but apparently East Riding of Yorkshire Council made one over Flemingate in Beverley, and nearer home your parish council have made two in a month!

First, the telephone box has got a reprieve – not the telephone, which will still be taken out - just the kiosk. One of our members had heard the same thing about defibrillators as mentioned last month, and it is with that purpose in mind that the parish council have paid its £1 and contracted to keep the kiosk. Ideally it would also have been re-sited elsewhere, but that has proved impossible, not least because of horrendous expense. However as it is, if a defibrillator is agreed before too long, then B.T. will kindly leave power connected to the box for a period of 7 years.

The second “about turn” resulted from a special meeting being called a week after the January one, when there was vociferous opposition to a decision made last October. When first being handed plans for a Tree Preservation Order at Bunkers Hill, the parish council considered there was no need for it and forwarded response accordingly. In December it was learned that a number of residents thought differently, some of whom attended the January meeting. The matter was investigated further in the week before the special meeting, at which it was then agreed to send another letter with an opposite view. There is much more time allowed to consider these things than there is for building plans, and the parish council’s change of position has been acknowledged. At the time of writing we have not heard whether the Order has been granted.

What that also meant, was that for the first time in ages we had a number of people “observing” at the January meeting and even more for the following special one. Very nice of course, but it usually means there is something contentious going on! Anyway, next meeting is 25th March.

Any organisation in the village looking for funding for a project will probably know that as well as Lissett Wind Farm eager to give them some money, there is Centrica (Caythorpe Gas Storage). I now have a load of application form/brochures from the latter, so if anyone would like one or two (dozen!) please let me know. Application deadline for this one is 31st March.

An interesting suggestion came up at the January meeting. That was for street lights to be switched off earlier instead of being left on all night. On contacting the county council I found that it is indeed possible to have them programmed to go off at midnight. There would be a cost involved at first, before we started saving a little within 3 years. This will be put to the parish council at the March meeting, but if anyone has any thoughts either way, I’m sure your nearest member would be pleased to hear them before the 25th please
