Dear Friends

This year Easter comes early and so in March we have Holy Week; the most important week in the Christian year. At one end of Holy Week we have Palm Sunday and the hollow welcome of Jesus, on a donkey, into Jerusalem (there will be a real donkey at the service at Burton Fleming!). We travel through to Maundy Thursday remembering the last supper including Jesus' washing of the disciples feet and command to us to be the servants of one-another.

On Holy Saturday a new fire (literally in the church porch!) bears into the darkness of death and the Easter Candle is lit. Our faith and the structure of our seasonal church services help to bring this truth alive for us.

Dog Poo - Bin that Bag

Most of us are responsible dog owners and clear up any mess our dogs make in a public place, footpaths, grass verges, parks etc. Unfortunately there are one or two who don't and that gives all dog owners a bad name. There is now legislation in place for the Parish Council, or any member of the public, to be able to take action against anyone whose dog is seen to make a mess in a public place and the owner does not clear it up. A report is sent to Beverley and an instant fine of £75 is issued. If this is not paid a £1000 fine can be expected following a hearing at the Magistrates court.

This legislation extends to people who allow their dog to roam free.

Please ensure that you have enough poo bags with you and bin the bag. Don't leave it in a hedge or on the roadside, take it home with you and bin it. Please help us to keep the village a safer place. Dog mess looks disgusting, can cause blindness in children and is not a pleasant sight for visitors to Rudston. Chris Shanks 420993







The question of buses around the village hasn't been dropped altogether, with attention now turning to the "pinch point" when there are parked vehicles for midweek events at church. Thank you to those who completed the bus survey forms though. Those have been duly passed on to the county council.

Meanwhile amendments to the 124 service have now been published. The Acklams service finishes on Thursday, 31st March, and there will be no further Saturday service. (Last of those 26th March) E.Y.M.S. then takes over with a Ruston Parva to Bridlington run on Wednesdays, and a Boynton to Driffield on Thursdays. Both will call in Rudston. Timings are 10 a.m. for Bridlington with a return at 1 p.m. on Wednesdays taking 20 minutes, and 9.35 a.m. for Driffield with a return at 1 p.m. on Thursdays. As noted previously that meanders around other villages and will take 40 minutes.

A new Register of Electors was received at Christmas, which showed a reduction of four on the previous year. However, February updates then showed an increase of three, so it is probably safe to say that the population of the village remains fairly constant.

The next parish council meeting is to be on Wednesday, 23rd March, when our PCSO, Andy Milner, also hopes to attend. From a subsequent letter by the area Inspector it seems his role has changed slightly, but we are assured (of course) that response to incidents and public safety remain top priorities. One of the changes is the discontinuing of monthly police reports, but the PCSO hopes to keep us informed by e-mail of local happenings. There has only been one of those to date with nothing for Rudston. The disappearance of the 14 year-old girl from the village would be a higher level police matter, and I'm sure everyone was relieved when she was soon found safe and well.

Communities are being invited to take part in a "Clean for the Queen" event taking place over a long weekend 4-6th March. The idea is a general litter clearance, ahead of the Queen's 90th Birthday later in the year.
