

We moved to Rudston 4 years ago, the Bosville Arms was closed and everybody we spoke to complained about the fact that the village no longer had a pub. There were even meetings about the viability of setting up a working fund to enable the village to buy the property.

Enter Andy Archer who invested a lot of time, effort and money into making the pub fit for use. He provided a free buffet to welcome people on the opening night and over the past two years has organised Halloween evenings, Christmas parties, New Years Eve parties, provided live music, fireworks displays and even re-introduced Rudstock.

Andy tried to fit in with the village, sponsoring the News Letter on more than one occasion and volunteering to help mow the Churchyard.

What did Andy gain for all his hard work, time and money? The answer is “not a lot”. Apart from a hard core of about 20 people who used the pub on a regular basis, but unfortunately not all at the same time, the only time the pub was anywhere near full was when people could get something for nothing – free supper, free live music, free firework display

I don't think this village deserves a public house, and now we haven't got one, again. In short, apathy rules and the business has gone the way of all the other businesses that used to thrive in villages.

More Glory Holes

Not being much good at quizzes, it was no surprise that I couldn't think of a two-word term covering the three different definitions of question 7 in September's newsletter. However, I was amazed at the answer. “Glory hole” to me meant two different things altogether.

Deciding to do a little investigation of my own I soon found that the OED agreed with my main understanding. In their words: “untidy room, drawer, or receptacle”. They also agreed with the quiz-setter's “quarry” meaning.

Turning to the computer, it should have been no surprise that the main meaning there was of a sexual nature, but really? Some of us have led sheltered lives! Moving swiftly on, the internet also came up with even more meanings, including the “glass-blowing” one, but the “dam/reservoir spillway” one remained elusive.

Nowhere however acknowledged my second meaning. If it existed beyond our family, it will now have fallen into disuse, because the glory hole was also the outside privy. At least, in the part of the West

Seating for two or more was not too uncommon, but ours was one adult and one child-size, which I think was pretty unusual.

My grandfather, whose cottage it was, died when I was two years old. Obviously I didn't get chance to ask him much(!), but his working life was in a stone quarry, so he may well have known of a few different “glory holes” 100 years ago.
