### DOG FOULING

Sue Ezard has asked me to once again repeat the message about dog fouling. It is especially bad on the footpath that runs alongside the Gypsey Race - probably because the offence is committed out of sight. There are also one or two dogs in the village that are apparently allowed to run free, and there is every possibility that they could be part of the problem.

Remember, dog fouling is socially unacceptable and has serious health implications, especially for young children. The deposits carry the eggs of the roundworm, Toxocara, which can cause blindness; the eggs can remain viable in the soil for two years.

The Dog (Fouling of Land) Act 1996, empowers local councils to be able to serve fixed penalty notices, which could lead to a subsequent court appearance, on those not cleaning up after their dogs. Some authorities are even resorting to DNA sampling to help them secure convictions.

If you have access to the Internet then you can easily report instances of dog fouling - anonymously if you wish - to the local council through the Fix My Street web-site, more of which is elsewhere in the Newsletter.

## Nature News

A spell of wintry weather during the first half of the month slowed activity almost to a standstill. There were, however, reports of three barn owls patrolling the Rudston-Burton Fleming road and at least two of them spent a lot of daylight hours foraging for food, using passing cars to disturb small mammals. Unfortunately, towards the middle of the month one of the owls was on the ground in the playing field. It was caught without much effort and the rescue and rehabilitation unit of the RSPCA was notified. An officer arrived an hour later and unfortunately found that the bird had died in the meantime. On examination, it was found to be no more than skin and bone and obviously had been unable to find any food during the period that snow covered the ground. Its crop was completely empty and it had starved to death due to lack of food for some considerable time.

An encouraging sign of spring is the pairing up of various species of birds, which during the winter have been in flocks together but have now disbanded and are setting up territory. Grey partridges are a noticeable example, along with some mallards and a few of the finch species. Another spell of inclement weather will, however, see this situation temporarily reversed. Yellowhammers have suddenly appeared along the hedgerows, having spent much of the winter along the coastal area, and rooks have begun to repair their nests high up in the trees. Activity is, however, limited and may well stop for a period before the breeding season gets into full swing.

There have been early forays on fine days from bumble bees in particular but clouds of gnats have been seen dancing in the sunlight. In the spell of milder weather in the middle of the month, sixteen individuals of six species of moths were trapped on one night, but there were no new records for the area.

A word from Roger Askham (Reader at Rudston and other churches in the Benefice)

One of my present joys is being able to visit the residents of 'The Willows' Residential Home in Burton Fleming. This has partly come about because my mother-in-law has become a resident there and also because I have been encouraged to visit as part of my Christian ministry as a Reader. It was during one of these visits to 'The Willows' that one of the residents told me of a poem that she had written around the late 1960s while on a residential course at Wooley Hall near Wakefield. She had written it while sat by the lake. (She has given me permission to use it.)

As I read the poem, I reflected on the comparison between the majority of our lives which generally are too filled with everything and anything, leaving very little room for God, and the lives of those people who because of age or illness appear to have very little with which to fill their day. I say appear, since one can never know what happens behind the closed doors of a person's room.

The start of March this year is also the start of Lent: a season during which we have an opportunity to have a hard look at the temptations of Jesus before the start of his ministry and how similar temptations affect our lives and our journey. As I read this poem I reflected on our journey. For each of us the "evening mist" creeps over our lake without us noticing it. There will be a time when we can no longer 'go our own way' as we say. In St John's Gospel (chapter 21) Jesus tells Peter "I tell you the truth, when you were younger you dressed yourself and went where you wanted; but when you are old you will

stretch out your hands, and someone else will dress you and lead you where you do not want to go."

May we all, whatever our circumstances, make time on our Lenten journey this year to be still before our great God & to receive his love into our hearts: a love so great that he sacrificed his Son for us.

### Crosslands Column

No sooner had I given the impression of nothing much going on (last month) than things started to happen! Firstly, Low Caythorpe Gas Storage plans. A new organisation has taken over there, and after a meeting in Boynton are to hold a presentation in Rudston. They originally suggested this should be at a parish council meeting, but we felt that a number of people from the village would probably be interested. Apart from the meeting room in the village hall being not exactly suited for "slide shows". There will therefore be a presentation in the main hall on Monday, 9th March, at 7.30 p.m. Would as many people as possible try to attend please.

The other matter is "Affordable Housing". This one should be advertised separately in the newsletter but it will be in the form of an open exhibition in the village hall on Tuesday, 17th March. It is understood that this will be "on-going" between 4p.m. and 8 p.m. Please feel free to look in any time between those hours, an invitation to parish council members too. The next parish council meeting happens to take place the following night (18th), but prior to the exhibition the parish council position is unchanged - we have yet to be convinced of the need for these houses in Rudston. Meanwhile, I have been reminded that the government Minister of Housing now responsible for this whole idea is none other than the infamous Margaret Becket. Maybe a case of "say no more"!

Another insert with this newsletter, if things have gone to plan, will invite a response from the village about the Action Plan. This has been updated by a parish council member. The initial response when this was introduced was excellent - maybe we can hope for something similar this time.

The same member "interpreted" some official Freedom of Information requirements -I find multi-page officialdom hard going sometimes. It is all designed to make parish councils even more "open" to the public. No secrets now, not that there were before, of course! However, one thing is that if anyone wishes to have a copy of any parish council paper, we can now charge £1 or more a time. (Don't all rush at once!)

The next event at the Community Centre in Driffield to advertise is one called "Back to the Good Old Days" at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, 1st April. Tickets only £5 for this one (but unreserved) from E.R.Y.C. Customer Service Centre, 01377 255556. With refreshments available too, this show sounds like particularly good value. (No, I'm not on a retainer!)

### **Fix My Street!**

Fix My Street - www.fixmystreet.com - is an Internet based service where issues such as potholes, fly-tipping, faulty street lights, dog-fouling, abandoned vehicles, etc., can all be reported.

The service is simple to use. You enter a post code close to where the problem is, you are then presented with a street map on which you can highlight the exact spot. Enter a brief description of the issue - you can even attach a photograph to enhance your complaint. After verification, a report is sent to the relevant local council that covers that particular post-code area, and, fingers crossed, action should be taken.

The web-sight has already been used by some people in Rudston to report potholes in Southside Lane and the wall near the church which had been hit by a vehicle exiting the field opposite. Both these issues have been dealt with so I have reported a problem myself, and will keep you posted.




